LEAD Program Marks 10 Years of Service to Adult Students

In 1995, Ohio Dominican University launched its Learning Enhanced Adult Degree (LEAD) Program. For several decades, Ohio Dominican has welcomed adult students to its community. The adult programs were developed to provide an environment that supports adults in taking responsibility for their educational goals. The adult programs respect and utilize the experience an adult brings to the classroom while integrating the Dominican worldview into the curriculum, providing academically qualified faculty, and enabling students to maintain employment while gaining preparation academically and spiritually to meet the demands of the workplace.

In response to growing demand, the LEAD Program opened an off-campus site in the burgeoning Easton business area in 2000. The Easton Campus currently serves more than 400 students and provides comprehensive on-site academic advising, tutoring, and financial aid services. In 2002, coinciding with the introduction of Ohio Dominican's first graduate program (Master of Business Administration), an additional off-site campus was opened at Tuttle Crossing.

This campus serves in excess of 150 students and provides the full set of comprehensive services just described. In addition, the LEAD Program has been offered in Marion, OH, and is currently operating in cooperation with corporate partnerships in Newark, OH, and Chillicothe, OH. All locations provide the full complement of support services on-site, which means that nearly 850 adult learners are served by the LEAD Program.

Congratulations to the LEAD Program on its outstanding service to the community and its 10th anniversary.



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Montreat College Hosts Grand Opening of Charlotte Campus

Montreat College celebrated the grand opening of its new Charlotte Campus on November 12, 2005. The new campus offers expanded and upgraded classroom space, a large break room and resource room, and more office space for the staff. The most exciting part is the signage on the new building. The new location is off of Interstate 77 and captures the attention of the daily commuters.



Those who attended the event were treated to hors d'oeuvres and live radio broadcasts from the location. Admissions representatives were on hand from the adult program and the 4-year traditional program in Montreat, NC. Local businesses in attendance offered special deals for students.



In another endeavor, Montreat has partnered with the Charlotte Chamber to offer MBA classes that are scheduled to start in January in the heart of Center City. The initiative is called Montreat on Main Street.



The College has a great partnership with the Chamber and looks forward to the exposure this venture will bring.

St. Gregory's University Readies for Graduate Program

It has been an eventful last few months at St. Gregory's University. In October 2005, the University was approved to offer a Master of Science of Management degree by the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools. St. Gregory's extends its thanks to all of the employees at IPD Corporate and the main campus that were involved with this process. The first cohort will be starting in spring 2006 at both the Tulsa, OK, and the Shawnee, OK, campuses.

In January 2006, IPD will be taking over the adult program for St. Gregory's in the Shawnee area. The main campus has offered an adult program for 8 years. As St. Gregory's moves forward with the graduate programs, IPD and the University have made the decision to continue to grow the partnership, and IPD will now be marketing the adult programs in the Shawnee and Oklahoma City areas in 2006. The first two cohorts are slated to start next month.

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Olivet Nazarene Launches Master of Organizational Leadership

Olivet Nazarene University has always been in the business of training leaders who will impact their world, but this past fall, the University's School of Graduate and Continuing Studies took that mission to the next level, launching a Master of Organizational Leadership degree program.

The 36-credit-hour program is designed to enhance the professional leadership skills of current business owners, managers, supervisors, and others in governmental, nonprofit, and community-based organizations — all from a decidedly Christian perspective.

“Our goal with this new degree program is not simply to train students to become competent leaders, but to inspire them to be leaders of integrity and purpose,” said Dr. Larry Huffman, director of Business programs for the School of Graduate and Continuing Studies. “This program is the perfect fit for Olivet’s ongoing mission.”

The degree is just one of the new features of Business programs offered through the School of Graduate and Continuing Studies:

- The University’s Continuing Studies Commission has approved the offering of two concentrations for the Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA) degree program beginning in the spring: Human Resources Management and Sales and Sales Management. Coursework is offered online. The University also now offers a certificate in Sales and Sales Management.
- The BBA program now includes seven online courses—Management Theory and Practice, Marketing Management, Human Resource Management, Business Law for Managers, Corporate Finance, Organizational Behavior, and Leadership and Ethics.
- New capstone courses in the BBA and Master of Business Administration programs incorporate computer-based simulated business games as the final project. Students are asked to develop strategic plans and business plans based on those simulations.

Warner Pacific College Growth Brings New Staff Members

This fall has been very busy at the Warner Pacific College Adult Degree Program, and the College has expanded its staff to accommodate the mushrooming enrollment and program growth. In just over a year’s time, Adult Degree Program has 222 students currently enrolled in three programs: Bachelor of Science in Business Administration, Bachelor of Science in Human Development, and Associate of Arts in Organizational Dynamics. The financial aid staff has doubled with the addition of **Kristen Mira**, and a recent graduate of the program, **Karen Banks**, now works as administrative assistant to Director of Student Services Rita Hughes.

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Cornerstone's MBA Program off to Strong Start

In October 2005, the Professional and Graduate Studies Division (PGS) of Cornerstone University successfully launched its first MBA cohort in Grand Rapids, MI, with 22 students. Dr. Robert Simpson, Dean of Professional and Graduate Studies, noted the MBA was one of the strongest starts for a new program in recent years. PGS is continuing to build MBA cohorts for the Kalamazoo, MI, and other regional campuses. Students are already beginning to sign up for the Global Business portion of the MBA program with destinations to China, Kenya, and other countries. PGS is anticipating the launch of two new MBA cohorts in Grand Rapids at the beginning of 2006.

In other developments, PGS will launch its first blended degree program for a Bachelor of Science in Ministry Leadership (BSML) in the spring of 2006. Students enrolled in the BSML-Blended program will take courses online, with five required 1-day seminar residencies. The Cornerstone University BSML-Blended program emphasizes the following:

- Foundational biblical and theological truths;
- The application of essential components of the Christian worldview;
- Gaining the skills necessary in managing and leading a ministry or not-for-profit organization; and
- A blended format of learning encompassing distance and on-ground educational environments.

Albertus Magnus Certificate Targets Healthcare Workers

The Albertus Magnus College New Dimensions Program has launched a new Healthcare Management Certificate Program. The program consists of five courses that provide

- an overview of the American healthcare system;
- unique characteristics of managing others in the healthcare system;
- financial issues that impact managing in the healthcare system;
- legal issues that impact healthcare management; and
- marketing in the healthcare environment.

The certificate program is targeted toward helping healthcare workers whose degrees or certificates are likely to be focused on a technical specialty. The program is designed to help provide management talent to an increasingly complex healthcare environment.

Belhaven Inducts Three Alumni Into President's Circle

Belhaven College recently inducted three alumni into its President's Circle. These alumni were recognized for referring students to the adult degree programs and were chosen based on the number of leads referred. The three alumni awarded with this honor were Tonya Loveless and Karry Parrish from the Jackson, MS, campus, and Travis Jacob from the Orlando, FL, campus. Tonya was present for the ceremony.

The Belhaven President's Circle has been in place for 3 years and recognizes up to 10 alumni who refer students to the adult program. These individuals are recognized at homecoming each year and are honored with a perpetual plaque in Raymond Hall, the adult studies building at the main campus.

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How Does Your Program Attrition Compare to CAAHE Averages?

IPD is now able to share the FY 2005 (September 1, 2004–August 31, 2005) annual attrition averages, by program, shown below. IPD calculates drops by taking the total number of drops, minus the re-entries, to obtain a net drop number. This number is used to calculate the Drop Rate, a snapshot number calculated annually. To obtain the Drop Rate, IPD uses the annual average ending monthly enrollment divided by the net drops. The CAAHE overall FY 2005 Drop Rate of 21.8% nearly equals that of FY 2004's overall Drop Rate of 21.6%.

The Drop/Start rate is also a snapshot number and tells us on an annual basis how many net drops compared to new starts we experienced. To obtain the Drop/Start rate, IPD uses the total number of starts divided by the net drops. In addition, IPD is now tracking overall Re-Entry Rates. Re-Entry Rates have a positive impact on the Drop Rate—the higher the Re-Entry Rate, the lower the Drop Rate will be. Colleges and universities with aggressive re-entry programs have lower Drop Rates.

New Dimensions Goes Virtual with CampusCruiser

Over the past year, Albertus Magnus College New Dimensions has been increasing the use of CampusCruiser, an integrated communication tool. CampusCruiser is a one-stop portal for all educational and administrative communication and resources, including e-mail, course materials, grades, school policy, forms, financial aid, and announcements.

Beginning last year, New Dimensions started with simply providing students with CampusCruiser e-mail addresses. In January 2005, all course guides were placed on CampusCruiser. Students also began receiving their grades online in January, and beginning next month, attendance will be tracked online.

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IPD Call Center Posts Impressive Retention Results

Now in its second year, the IPD Call Center retention effort is working. The retention rate of 86 percent for the eight participating institutions from September 1, 2004, through August 31, 2005, marks a 20-percent improvement from the 66 percent recorded for the same eight schools in the prior year.

The concept is simple. Communicate with the students after they start their degree programs. Many individuals communicate frequently with them during the enrollment process and have a pretty good sense of their needs and how they are feeling about the institution as they prepare for their first class. Then what happens? Enrollment personnel move on to the next student, orientation is over so they must have everything they need, or so the thinking goes.

Under the direction of Dr. Sue Salter and IPD Call Center Manager Kieth Schumacher, IPD implemented a program to slow down the growing drop rate by developing a series of seven “student touch points” during the first three courses of a degree program.

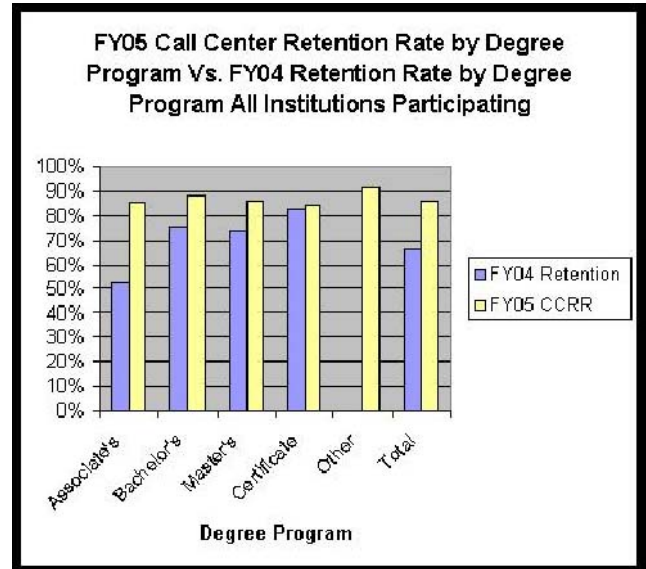
From prior research, it was determined that 80 percent of the students who drop did so within those first three courses. The Call Center makes two attempts to reach the student at each touch point, leaving a voice mail at a work number (primary) or a home number if a work number is not available.

The focus of the call is very straightforward. The main question asked of the students each time they are contacted is “Do you have any questions or concerns about your degree program at this time?” A “yes” answer triggers a referral from the Call Center to the appropriate student services personnel guaranteeing the student that someone will be back in touch with him or her within 72 hours. A “no” response triggers some warm, friendly encouragement with a “We’ll be in touch” message until the final class of the third course, when the Call Center representative makes sure the student has the appropriate student services names and phone numbers if future concerns should arise.

The students are delighted to have someone representing the institution call them after they have started the program. They view the calls as the institution caring and making an effort to ensure their success. Student services teams have said that although this proactive approach is a little more work, it has allowed them to handle many problems early and, in some cases, kept the student from dropping the program. Of the 14 categories comprising the types of referrals or concerns, financially related concerns account for the largest share of the referral types, at 28 percent, with “miscellaneous” (includes personal reasons or drops) next, at 21 percent of the referral types.

The Retention Calling Program is only a piece of the entire retention puzzle. 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Academic Services

Albertus, Cornerstone Use Technology to Keep Faculty Involved

Two CAAHE member institutions are putting their course management systems to use for more than just courses. Albertus Magnus College and Cornerstone University are using their online tools to engage and train faculty members.

Albertus Magnus New Dimensions has launched an online team-based curriculum development process, using technology-mediated tools that engage their affiliated faculty members and enable them to participate in various virtual “CORE” curriculum teams. New Dimensions is using its *CampusCruiser* Learning & Teaching Portal to support the curriculum and best practices learning environment in an attempt to engage affiliated faculty members and provide access to their being active team members in the curriculum.

Professional and Graduate Studies at Cornerstone University has begun rigorous faculty training via the Blackboard Learning System. The main goal is to have all faculty members possess a minimum level of expertise with the use of Blackboard, such as using discussion boards, posting a syllabus, and recording students’ grades.

The faculty training is divided into three levels:

- **Level 1**—An online tutorial and quiz over Blackboard basics
- **Level 2**—A face-to-face group session where faculty members are guided through the processes of grading, loading syllabi, and class maintenance
- **Level 3**—Small 3-week online cohorts where faculty members are trained on how to teach an online course as well as how to build and promote a Christian community online



It is the hope of Professional and Graduate Studies to use this training not only to increase the effectiveness of faculty members in a changing culture but also to find facilitators for future online courses from the pool of existing faculty members.

Learning Teams Can Opt to Meet Online

Students at Albertus Magnus College New Dimensions have the option of meeting face-to-face or virtually to complete team assignments! All learning teams have the ability to set up a “learning team club file” on *CampusCruiser*, the College’s learning and teaching portal.

Once in the club, team members can post documents, ask questions, share files, and compile assignments using the Message Board feature. Instructors may ask to see a printout that demonstrates the quality of team postings associated with each week’s assignments.

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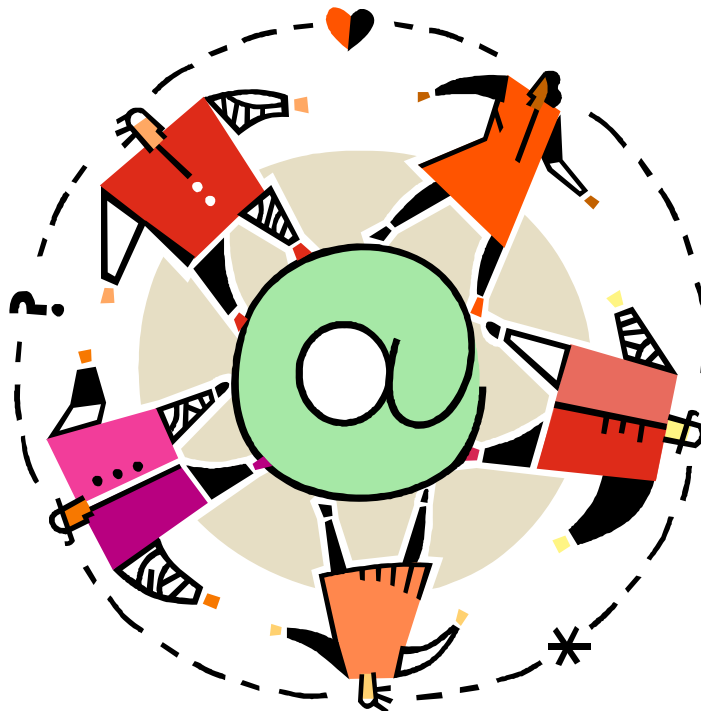
Student Services

College Takes New Approach for Student Rep Meetings

For the December 2005 Student Representative meeting at Albertus Magnus College New Dimensions, Academic Advisor Chad Marcel is introducing an alternative to the on-site Student Representative meetings—the December meeting will be held VIRTUALLY.

Chad created a club on CampusCruiser named “December 2005 Student Rep Meeting.” During the period of December 1–15, 2005, Representatives and staff members can converse via the Message Board postings. Representatives will be able to post questions and comments, and the Albertus administration can post announcements and respond to questions.

Chad is hoping this format will enable more Representatives to be involved in the meetings. Because December is such a busy time for all, holding the meeting via the CampusCruiser Message Board will hopefully be an interesting and time-saving experiment. Ideally, the Virtual Meeting format could be used for live meetings in the future.



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Financial Aid

Federal Student Loans Threatened in Budget-Cutting Effort

As Congressional leaders prepare to work out an agreement on cutting the federal budget, student loans are among the programs targeted. The U.S. House of Representatives, as part of the Deficit Reduction Act of 2005 (HR 4241), voted to make it more expensive for borrowers to take out loans or consolidate federal student loans after July 1, 2006.

According to an article by Stephen Burd in the December 2, 2005, issue of *The Chronicle of Higher Education*, the bill would “cut about \$50 billion from federal entitlement programs by the end of the decade, with more than a third of the reductions—\$14.3 billion—coming from the government’s student-loan programs” (“House Narrowly Passes Bill That Cuts Into Student Loans,” p. A24).

Also according to the *Chronicle* article, leaders from the two chambers will meet to work out differences in their versions of the budget-reconciliation legislation. The bill approved by the Senate (S 1932) calls for cutting \$36 billion from federal entitlement programs and using some of the savings to create grant programs for low-income families.

The budget-reconciliation effort may have huge implications for the Higher Education Act, which expires at the end of the year. The outcome of the negotiations between the chambers could determine whether Congress will be able to complete work on legislation to reauthorize, or extend, the Act (Burd, 2005, p. A24). Institutions Must Document Student’s Intent to Withdraw

Official notification of a student’s intent to withdraw from an institution occurs when he or she notifies a designated office. In its written withdrawal procedures, an institution must designate at least one office for this purpose. A student has provided official notification if he or she provides notification to an employee of the designated office while that person is acting in his or her official capacity.

Official notification can be provided by the student either orally or in writing. Some acceptable notifications from a student can include notification via telephone, through a designated Web site, or in person. The institution is responsible for documenting oral notifications. However, the institution may request, but not require, the student to confirm his or her oral notification in writing. If a student mails a letter to the designated office informing it of his or her intent to withdraw, the withdrawal date is the date the institution receives the letter. Remember, institutions always have the option of using the date of a student’s last participation in an academically related activity as long as that participation is documented by a campus official. Indiana Wesleyan Bids Adieu To Dr. Mark Smith, Welcomes Others to New Positions

Dr. Mark Smith to Become President of Circleville Bible College

CAAHE says farewell to one of its most innovative leaders as Dr. Mark Smith, Vice President of Adult and Professional Studies (APS) at Indiana Wesleyan University, accepts a call to become President of Circleville Bible College in Ohio. Dr. Smith has energized Indiana Wesleyan since starting as a faculty recruiter in 1996. As Associate Dean and later as Dean, he led efforts to improve the quality of adult education by instituting a standardized curriculum module, an extensive assessment system, and systems for recruiting and training quality faculty. He spearheaded efforts to upgrade education sites from hotel rooms to newly constructed Education Centers, giving adult education new prominence in Indiana. The University has six Education Centers in Indiana, three in Ohio, and three in Kentucky, with plans for several more.

Under Dr. Smith's leadership as Dean and then as Vice President, enrollment in Indiana Wesleyan's adult education programs grew from 5,700 students to more than 9,000 students. Most importantly, the years of Dr. Smith's influence were a time when the Adult and Professional Studies Program became more closely tied to the Christian mission of Indiana Wesleyan. Always a pastor at heart, Mark's passion is to expand and improve the quality of Christian higher education. So he leaves to impact another college with a vision to further advance opportunities for a Christ-centered education.

Familiar Faces Named New Vice President and New Dean at Indiana Wesleyan

Indiana Wesleyan University is pleased to announce that Dr. Mike Bonner will become the new Vice President for Adult and Graduate Studies. Dr. Bonner is in his fourth year of service at the University. During this time he has had key leadership positions, including Assistant Dean for Graduate Education and Director of the Education Leadership Program. In addition Dr. Bonner has served on several college and university committees.
